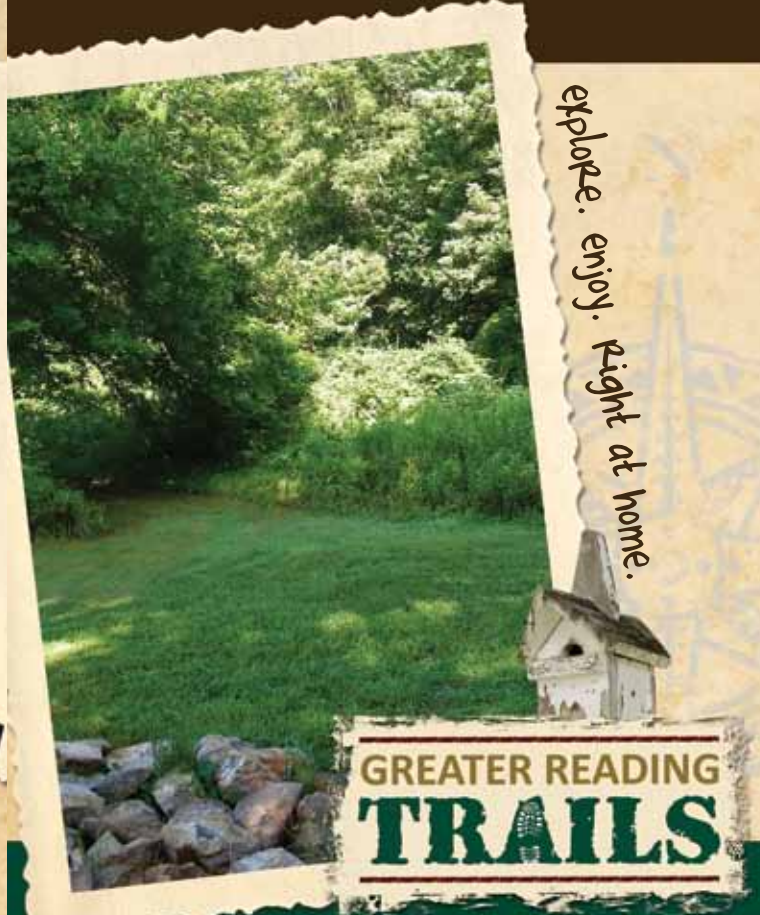

ABOUT THE SANCTUARY

Earl Poole Sanctuary is a 30+ acre Conservancy-owned property and is the result of a generous land donation in the late 70's. The site is located in the Antietam Creek Watershed and is managed for wildlife. It includes a barn, trails, wooded areas, a stream, picnic areas, and is a popular birding site. We look forward to sharing this special place with you to introduce you to the native wildflowers, birds, and insects that call our property "home".

THE SANCTUARY'S HISTORY

The rich soils of the property provided a successful working farm and apple orchard up until about 1970. The farm sold vinegar, cider, potatoes, eggs and butter. The only building that remains from the farming days is the barn. A unique cider press was removed from the property in 2003 and relocated to a local business in Bowers, PA.

ABOUT DR. EARL L. POOLE

This natural area sanctuary has been named in honor of Dr. Earl L. Poole (1891-1972), famed ornithologist and artist. Dr. Poole's illustrations have graced the pages of many books and endeared the peering eyes of many to the birds of Berks County. Dr. Poole was an artist, scientist, teacher, and author. In 1930, Poole wrote *The Bird Life of Berks County, Pennsylvania* and in 1932 he wrote *A Survey of the Mammals of Berks County*. Poole was one of the founders of the Baird Ornithological Club, still active locally today. In 1947, Poole's *A Half Century of Bird Life in Berks County* was published by the Reading Public Museum.

Earl Poole Sanctuary is for the birdwatcher, nature explorer, hiker or someone who is looking for native wildflowers and birds. A quiet place to explore nature on your own...

EARL POOLE SANCTUARY

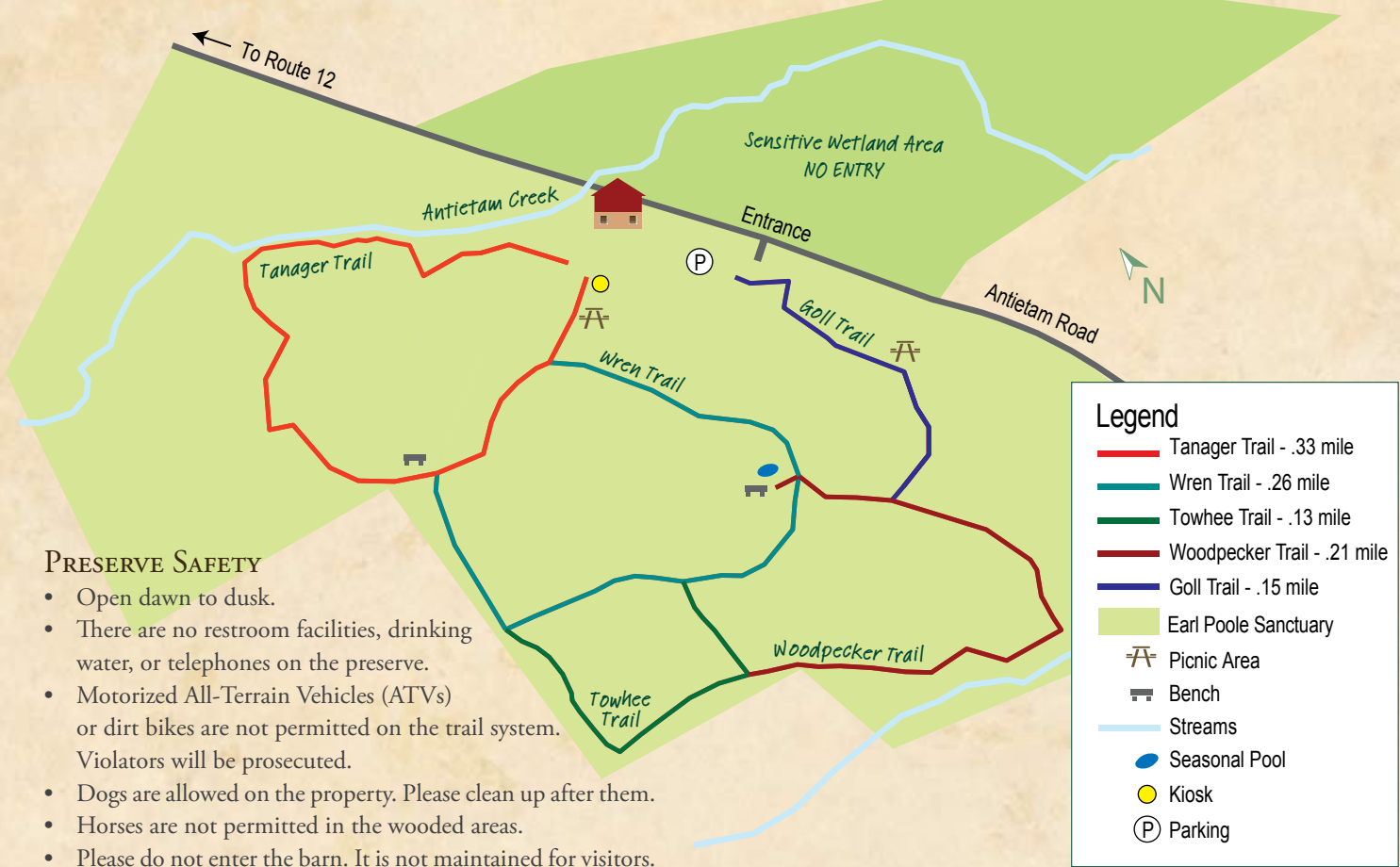
THE EARL POOLE SANCTUARY includes a variety of habitats for wildlife-including woodlands, meadows and successional fields. Native species of shrubs, trees and wildflowers were planted to encourage indigenous birds and wildlife. The sanctuary is a headwater of the Antietam Creek providing cool source water downstream into Antietam Lake in Lower Alsace Township. Birdwatchers can spot numerous species at Earl Poole Sanctuary, including the Scarlet Tanager, Downy Woodpecker, Baltimore Oriole, Wood Thrush and Towhee. Seasonal pools serve as breeding grounds for amphibians such as the Wood Frog.

DIRECTIONS TO EARL POOLE SANCTUARY

Antietam Road, Alsace Township
From Pricetown Road (Route 12): Enter Antietam Road (across from Giannotti’s Restaurant) next to Alsace Manor Fire Company and travel 1.2 miles to the Earl Poole Sanctuary. Entrance will be on your right, between Beckers Road and Blankenbiller Road. (Drive slowly. The entrance is easy to miss!)

From Lower Alsace/Mount Penn region: Follow Antietam Road north into Alsace Township. The Earl Poole Sanctuary will be on your left, 0.7 mile from the intersection of Antietam Road, Basket Road, and Church Hill Road. (Drive slowly. The entrance is easy to miss!)

An unlocked chained gate is at the entrance of the preserve. You can unhook the chain to park your car. Please rehook the chain when you leave to prevent vandalism and illegal dumping.



PRESERVE SAFETY

- Open dawn to dusk.
- There are no restroom facilities, drinking water, or telephones on the preserve.
- Motorized All-Terrain Vehicles (ATVs) or dirt bikes are not permitted on the trail system. Violators will be prosecuted.
- Dogs are allowed on the property. Please clean up after them.
- Horses are not permitted in the wooded areas.
- Please do not enter the barn. It is not maintained for visitors.
- We recommend that you carry a phone with you during your visit. In case of an emergency, dial 9-1-1.
